

From the Principal




Welcome back to 2017. I see it as a privilege to lead KICE as Principal for 2017. I have an outstanding staff group across the three campuses and as a team we are committed to

Sleep & School

To thrive and learn, kids need the ability to focus, retain information and be creative problem solvers. Success at school also requires kids to control impulses and manage their emotions to make good choices and stay on track! **All of these skills depend on getting a consistent and healthy amount of sleep.**

The following is a recommended guide:

- **Children aged 3-6 years old need about 10-13 hours sleep per night**
- **Children aged 6-12 years old need about 9-11 hours sleep per night**

• Children aged 12-15 years still need 9 hours of sleep per night

You can help your child get a good night's sleep by following a consistent bedtime routine and trying to go to bed and wake at the same time each day. For younger children, this can include a bath, brush teeth and a bedtime story. For older children, it could be relaxing, listening to music, writing or reading.

Using technology such as computers, phones and iPads before bed can severely impact a young person's quality of sleep

and their ability to function effectively the next day. **If possible, it is recommended that all children avoid using screen devices for at least an hour before their set bed time** – this allows them to fall asleep with less difficulty and work successfully during the day.

If you need support around sleep for your child, there are many resources the school can provide or Parenting KI is able to provide support and information for children of all ages.

Having Kevin on board means that we are able to offer units of competency from Commercial Cookery as well as continuing the work we have been doing in Hospitality. The first competency that students will be gaining experience in is Producing Pastries, this is an area of specialisation for Kevin.



The Coffee Conundrum Training Café will continue this year with some experienced staff (Yr. 12 students) coaching and mentoring the less experienced staff (Yr. 11 students). Students all work to a roster and the hope is that over the year they will have the opportunity to have multiple chances to experience working under pressure as baristas, cashiers and in food service. One of the most important skills is learning to work effectively and positively with other people and always have a smiling face for customers.

The other exciting opportunity for students is that we will be able to operate with a separate cooking staff to serving staff. In the past students have had to try to do both jobs, which has been very challenging. We will begin lunchtime service with a patisserie at the end of this term. Through the SA – China Engagement Strategy the government's vision is 'to strengthen the State's partnership with China and enhance and deepen our



long-term engagement in areas encompassing investment, trade and business, education, sport, culture, the arts, sciences, and the exchange of people, skills and ideas'.

As reported in the KI Annual Report we too have a local commitment to strengthen ties with China. KICE is building on and supporting this engagement through the implementation of Chinese Mandarin language and culture to all classes,

Meningococcal B Immunisation

Did you know South Australia has the highest rate of the potentially life threatening meningococcal disease in the country? And, of all meningococcal cases, 80 per cent of infections in Australia are caused by the B strain? Currently, the only way to be protected from Meningococcal B is to pay for immunisation through your GP.

With children under five years of age and young adults aged 15-24 years most at risk, the

University of Adelaide is leading a study in partnership with SA Health to establish whether there are herd immunity benefits derived as a result of vaccination. The study, which aims to provide free public access to the Meningococcal B vaccine, will examine whether when a significant portion of a population is immunised against a disease, society can prevent the transmission of that disease from one

person to another and protect those who are not immune.

All South Australian high schools can B PART OF IT! In 2017, Year 10, 11 and 12 students across the state will be eligible to participate in the study. Information and consent packs are being distributed this week.

The SLLIP (Senior Leader, Learning Improvement Primary) position focuses on the DECD Strategy of Learning Design, Assessment and Moderation. The role of the SLLIP is to work with teachers and the leadership group across KICE to develop moderation processes, with a focus on STEM (Science, Technologies, Engineering and Mathematics) practices.

Alongside the SLLIP, we also have the NLRP (Numeracy & Literacy Results Plus) Project Officer. The NLRP Project Officer has four key focus areas:

- Strategic planning for numeracy and literacy improvement
- Support change in teaching practices
